43. Recalls **the** positive developments concerning the EU-Canada trade agreement (CETA); notes that during its first full calendar year of implementation, bilateral trade in goods, including agri-food products, grew by 10.3 %, compared to the average of the previous three years; recalls that the EU's trade surplus with Canada rose by 60 % and created additional opportunities for our exporters; **also recalls that since the provisional entry into force of the agreement the two parties have created a solid partnership by accompanying the original text with important recommendations on trade, climate action and the Paris agreement, trade and gender, and SMEs, and considers this to be proof of the dynamic of a trade agreement in its implementation**; invites the Commission to transmit to Parliament more recent data relating to exports by EU SMEs and the overall sustainability of the agreement; recalls the importance of strengthening implementation and follow-up of the TSD chapter;

43. Recalls **some** positive developments concerning the EU-Canada trade agreement (CETA); notes that during its first full calendar year of implementation, bilateral trade in goods, including agri-food products, grew by 10.3 %, compared to the average of the previous three years; recalls that the EU's trade surplus with Canada rose by 60 % and created additional opportunities for our exporters; **is, however, particularly worried about the outcome of the final report of an audit carried out in Canada from 9 September 2019 to 20 September 2019 in order to evaluate the control systems in place governing the production of bovine and pig meat intended for export to the European Union published by the Commission's Directorate-General For Health and Food Safety, which concludes that 'the system for traceability of [hormone-free] EU-eligible cattle ...showed a number of shortcomings' and that cattle databases 'contain incomplete information on animal movements [and] do not allow a comprehensive oversight of traceability of EU-eligible cattle'; is therefore highly concerned that there is a clear risk that meat from animals fed with hormones can enter the single market, breaching all EU norms and standards and putting into serious doubt similar**

systems and controls established under free trade agreements; invites the Commission to transmit to Parliament more recent data relating to exports by EU SMEs and the overall sustainability of the agreement; recalls the importance of strengthening implementation and follow-up of the TSD chapter;
